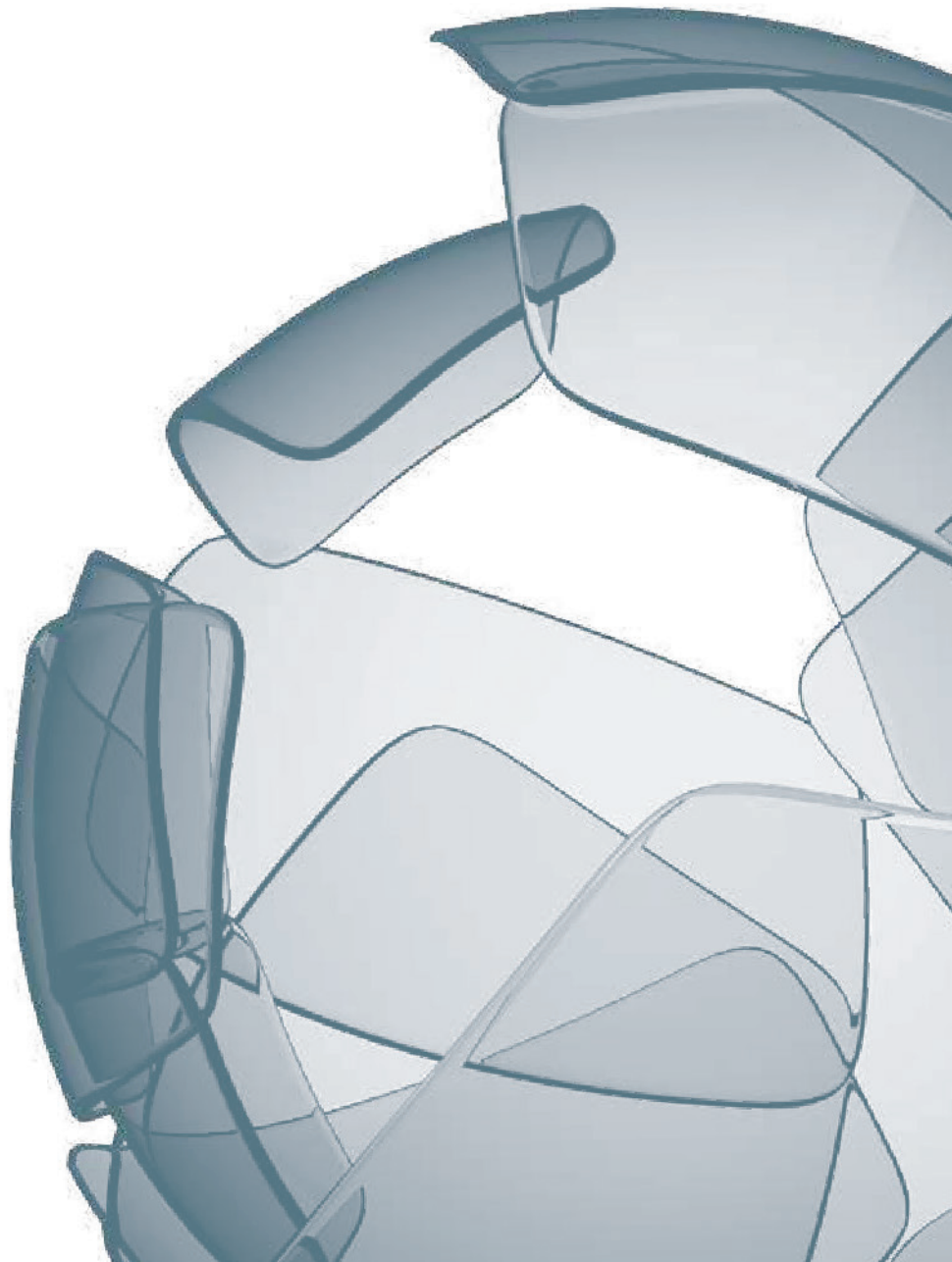

III. LAWS OF THE GAME AND DECISIONS OF THE BOARD

To consider the following proposals and amendments submitted under the International Football Association Board's regulations.

1. Law 1 – The Field of Play (Submitted by FIFA)

The Corner Arc

Present Text

- A quarter circle with radius of 1 m (1 yd) from each corner flagpost is drawn inside the field of play.

Proposed Text

- A quarter circle with radius of **2 m (2.2 yds)** from each corner flagpost is drawn inside the field of play.

Reason

To provide the players especially in stadiums where there is only a short distance between the commercial advertising or stands and the pitch sufficient space to kick the ball.

2. Law 4 – The Players' Equipment (Submitted by FIFA)

Basic Equipment

Present Text

The basic compulsory equipment of a player is:

- a jersey or shirt;
- shorts – if thermal undershorts are worn, they are of the same main colour as the shorts;
- stockings;
- shinguards;
- footwear

Proposed Text

The basic compulsory equipment of a player **comprises the following separate items:**

- a jersey or shirt;
- shorts – if thermal undershorts are worn, they are of the same main colour as the shorts;
- stockings;
- shinguards;
- footwear

Reason

Adding "... the following separate items:" ensures that the basic equipment must consist of individual garments and therefore a player's jersey and shorts may not be joined together in any way.

Cautionable Offences

5. Law 12 – Fouls and Misconduct (Submitted by FIFA)

Sending-Off Offences

Present Text	Proposed Text
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A player is sent off and shown the red card if he commits any of the following seven offences: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. is guilty of serious foul play 2. is guilty of violent conduct 3. spits at an opponent or any other person 4. denies the opposing team a goal or an obvious goalscoring opportunity by deliberately handling the ball (this does not apply to a goalkeeper within his own penalty area) 5. denies an obvious goalscoring opportunity to an opponent moving towards the player's goal by an offence punishable by a free kick or a penalty kick 6. uses offensive or insulting or abusive language and/or gestures 7. receives a second caution in the same match. <p>A player who has been sent off must leave the vicinity of the field of play and the technical area</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A player, substitute or substituted player is sent off and shown the red card if he commits any of the following seven offences: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. is guilty of serious foul play 2. is guilty of violent conduct 3. spits at an opponent or any other person 4. denies the opposing team a goal or an obvious goalscoring opportunity by deliberately handling the ball (this does not apply to a goalkeeper within his own penalty area) 5. denies an obvious goalscoring opportunity to an opponent moving towards the player's goal by an offence punishable by a free kick or a penalty kick 6. uses offensive or insulting or abusive language and/or gestures 7. receives a second caution in the same match. <p>A player, substitute or substituted player who has been sent off and shown the red card must leave the vicinity of the field of play and the technical area</p>

6. Law 12 – Fouls and Misconduct
(Submitted by FIFA)

New Decision 7

Present Text

Proposed Text

Once the referee has stopped the match to award a free kick, any player from the team that committed the foul who deliberately touches the ball and thereby delays play or provokes a confrontation with an opponent is considered to be delaying the restart of play and shall be punished with a yellow card. This sanction also applies to a player who touches the ball when a throw-in or corner kick is awarded to the opposing team and when a player takes the ball from the goal net after his team has scored a goal and thus delays the opposing team's kick-off.

Reason

To stop unsporting tactics to delay the restart of play, such as holding the ball for a few seconds or throwing it away.

7. Law 14 – The Penalty Kick Infringements/Sanctions

Present Text

If the referee gives the signal for a penalty kick to be taken and, before the ball is in play, one of the following situations occurs:

The player taking the penalty kick infringes the Laws of the Game:

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- if the ball enters the goal, the kick is retaken
- if the ball does not enter the goal, the referee stops play and restarts the match with an indirect free kick to the defending team

The goalkeeper infringes the Laws of the Game:

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- if the ball enters the goal, a goal is awarded
- if the ball does not enter the goal, the kick is retaken

Proposed Text

If the referee gives the signal for a penalty kick to be taken and, before the ball is in play, one of the following situations occurs:

The player taking the penalty kick infringes the Laws of the Game:

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- if the ball enters the goal, the kick is retaken
- if the ball does not enter the goal, the referee stops play and restarts the match with an indirect free kick, **from the place where the infringement occurred**, to the defending team

The goalkeeper infringes the Laws of the Game:

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- if the ball enters the goal, a goal is awarded
- if the ball does not enter the goal, the kick is retaken

NOTES

A team-mate of the player taking the kick enters the penalty area or moves in front of or within 9.15 m (10 yds) of the penalty mark:

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- If the ball enters the goal, the kick is retaken
- If the ball does not enter the goal, the referee stops play and restarts the match with an indirect free kick to the defending team
- If the ball rebounds from the goalkeeper, the crossbar or the goalpost and is touched by this player, the referee stops play and restarts the match with an indirect free kick to the defending team.

A team-mate of the goalkeeper enters the penalty area or moves in front of or within 9.15 m (10 yds) of the penalty mark:

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- if the ball enters the goal, a goal is awarded
- if the ball does not enter the goal, the kick is retaken

A player of both the defending team and the attacking team infringe the Laws of the Game:

- the kick is retaken

A team-mate of the player taking the kick **infringes the Laws of the Game enters the penalty area or moves in front of or within 9.15 m (10 yds) of the penalty mark:**

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- if the ball enters the goal, the kick is retaken
- if the ball does not enter the goal, the referee stops play and restarts the match with an indirect free kick, **from the place where the infringement occurred**, to the defending team
- **If the ball rebounds from the goalkeeper, the crossbar or the goalpost and is touched by this player, the referee stops play and restarts the match with an indirect free kick to the defending team.**

A team-mate of the goalkeeper **infringes the Laws of the Game enters the penalty area or moves in front of or within 9.15 m (10 yds) of the penalty mark:**

- the referee allows the kick to proceed
- if the ball enters the goal, a goal is awarded
- if the ball does not enter the goal, the kick is retaken

A player of both the defending team and the attacking team infringe the Laws of the Game:

- the kick is retaken

NOTES

If, after the penalty kick has been taken:

The kicker touches the ball a second time (except with his hands) before it has touched another player:

- an indirect free kick is awarded to the opposing team, the kick to be taken from the place where the infringement occurred. * (see page 3)

The kicker deliberately handles the ball before it has touched another player:

- a direct free kick is awarded to the opposing team, the kick to be taken from the place where the infringement occurred. * (see page 3)

The ball is touched by an outside agent as it moves forward:

- the kick is retaken

The ball rebounds into the field of play from the goalkeeper, the crossbar or the goalposts, and is then touched by an outside agent:

- the referee stops play
- play is restarted with a dropped ball at the place where it touched the outside agent. * (see page 3)

If, after the penalty kick has been taken:

The kicker touches the ball a second time (except with his hands) before it has touched another player:

- an indirect free kick is awarded to the opposing team, the kick to be taken from the place where the infringement occurred. * (see page 3)

The kicker deliberately handles the ball before it has touched another player:

- a direct free kick is awarded to the opposing team, the kick to be taken from the place where the infringement occurred. * (see page 3)

The ball is touched by an outside agent as it moves forward:

- the kick is retaken

The ball rebounds into the field of play from the goalkeeper, the crossbar or the goalposts, and is then touched by an outside agent:

- the referee stops play
- play is restarted with a dropped ball at the place where it touched the outside agent. * (see page 3)

Reason

To be consistent with the other infringements (proposed new text).
Bullet point 4 is covered by bullet point 3

8. Law 17 – The Corner Kick

Procedure

Present Text	Proposed Text
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> opponents remain at least 9.15 m (10 yds) from the ball until it is in play 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> opponents remain at least 9.15 m (10 yds) from the ball the corner arc until the ball is in play

Reason

To be consistent with Law 1.

Dealing with injured players - Exceptions
